

# Arky Facts April 2022

Thursday, April 21-7:30 PM
"The Archaeology of Childhood"
with Jane Eva Baxter, Ph.D.

It is hard to imagine, given how ever-present children are in our modern world, that archaeologists did not begin to study children until about 25 years ago. What can the study of children and

childhood offer to archaeology that the study of adults alone cannot? Where can we find traces of children in the archaeological record? How can an archaeology of children and childhood help us develop more human understandings of our shared past?

As an archaeologist whose work on children began in the 1990s, Dr. Baxter will answer some of these questions using examples from the paleolithic to the present, and from around the globe. She will discuss children in families, education, apprenticeship, and learning, children at work and play, and the death and commemoration of children. This presentation of children living very different lives than young people in our own society can help us question the assumptions we make about our own lives, while gaining an appreciation for the lives of those who came before us.



Jane Eva Baxter, Ph.D. is Associate Professor and Chair of Anthropology at DePaul University, Chicago.



### IAAA ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

Friday, April 22 – Sunday, April 24



The 2022 Annual Business Meeting of the Illinois Association for Advancement of Archaeology will take place at the **Elmhurst History Museum** in Elmhurst, Illinois. The museum exhibit "People of the Prairie: 12,000 years in DuPage County" will be open during the conference, and there will be field trips to visit a nearby mound group. The museum will also make available exhibits in the **Glos Mansion**, built in 1874 as the home of Henry and Lucy Glos. The actual meeting will take place next door at the Education Center, located one block from downtown Elmhurst.

There will be a Friday "Meet & Greet" which will allow people a chance to get together, have light snacks, and get an early visit at "People of the Prairie." Saturday's agenda will include the business meeting and public lectures discussing the archaeology of northeastern Illinois. On Sunday morning, there will be a field trip to view the collections housed at the Warrenville Historical Museum & Art Gallery and a visit to Winfield Mounds.

#### Persepolis After Lindon Smith: The Modernist Afterlife of the Ruins

This Zoom lecture is in connection with the OI Museum Special Exhibition, "Joseph Lindon Smith: The Persepolis Paintings," on display January 27–August 28, 2022

Join Talinn Grigor as she traces the art history of the ruins of Persepolis in the aftermath of its excavation by Ernst Herzfeld and artistic renderings by Joseph Lindon Smith in the 1930s. As an

accurate architectural prototype as well as a utopian-nationalist trope, the image of Persepolis circulated in and out of artistic and sociopolitical life both in Iran and abroad. The core of Mohammad Reza Shah's 1930s urban reform in Tehran consisted of



Persian Style revival edifices that mimicked Persepolis. On and next to the terrace, Reza Shah celebrated "the 2,500-year Anniversary of the Founding of the Persian Empire by Cyrus the Great" in October 1971.

Dr. Talinn Grigor is professor and chair of the Art History Program in the Department of Art and Art History at the University of California, Davis.
