# Thursday, March 18 - 7:30 PM (via ZOOM) "The Greatest Race: Chariot Racing in Imperial Rome" Dr. Sinclair Bell

Chariot races were the earliest, most popular, and longest-lived of all forms of "spectacles" in the Roman world. This program will survey the spatial and architectural framework of the Circus Maximus, the primary chariot racing venue at Rome, and circuses around the empire; the organization of the races, including the role of the factions; the symbolic representations of victories and athletic victors, as well as the charioteers' actual prizes; and the horses that were bred for racing. Dr. Bell will also briefly discuss the sport's spectators and fans, for whom the sport was a socially binding religion.

Our focus will be on the first through the fourth centuries A.D., with the bulk of the evidence (literary, epigraphic, artistic and archaeological) drawn from the first two centuries. In keeping with current directions in the study of ancient sport and spectacle, Dr. Bell's approach will place less emphasis on the legal and technical aspects of the chariot races, and more on these competitions as "part of a broader social canvas."



Dr. Sinclair Bell is a classical archaeologist and art historian, and is presently Full Professor of Art History at Northern Illinois University. His lecture will draw upon material from his recent documentary for the Smithsonian Channel (2019) and his forthcoming book, "*Chariot Racing in Roman Imperial Art and Culture: Athletic Competition, Social Practice, and Urban Spectacle*" (University of Pennsylvania Press).

**There will be two ways to attend on March 18.** The program will be broadcast via a *ZOOM* presentation at the Irwin Center. ### In the News !! Oldest Cave Painting in the World

Archaeologists have uncovered the oldest-known cave painting made by prehistoric humans after stumbling upon the life-size image of a wild pig painted on a cave wall in Sulawesi, Indonesia at least 45,500 years ago. Humans have hunted warty pigs across Sulawesi for tens of thousands of years, with the animal frequently featured in prehistoric art.

The image was painted onto the walls of Leang Tedongnge cave using red ochre pigment. Two distinct handprints can be seen to the left of the animal and two other, partially preserved paintings of pigs were found nearby.



The island of Sulawesi has a rich history of human presence, including stone artifacts and fossils possibly linked to relatives of modern-day Homo sapiens. The cave itself is located in a valley that's enclosed by steep limestone cliffs and is only accessible by a narrow cave passage in the dry season. For further reading, visit:
