# "The First Kings of Europe" Dr. William Parkinson, Field Museum of Chicago University of Illinois (Chicago)



"The First Kings of Europe" exhibit, currently running through January 28, 2024 at the Field Museum, follows the paths of ancient European kings, queens, and rulers as they rose to power. This collaboration of over two dozen museums and archaeological institutes in the Balkan Peninsula tells the story of how a small group of individuals established tremendous power. Featured in the exhibit are weapons, jewelry, tools, and archaeological finds that have never been shown in North America. William Parkinson, PhD will explain how this exhibit was assembled, revealing a gradual rise of social complexity, hierarchical authority, and dazzling kingdoms.

Dr. William Parkinson is Curator & Associate Director of Anthropology, Negaunee Integrative Research Center at the Field Museum and Professor, Department of Anthropology, University of Illinois (Chicago). He is a specialist in European and eastern Mediterranean prehistory.

# "Singing Bird and the Importance of Native American Women in Illinois History"

The I & M Canal Corridor Association will host a **free** Illinois Humanities Road Scholars Speakers Bureau presentation entitled "Singing Bird and the Importance of Native American Women in Illinois History" with Kim Sigafus.

Dressed in her native regalia, Kim will be giving a history of the natives in Illinois with a focus on native women, or what was considered "The Hidden Half." Her primary focus will be women such as Singing Bird (Blackhawk's wife), and Hononegah. Kim will bring the audience into these women's day-to-day lives, including courting, marriage, and child-rearing. She will also talk about their role in their husbands' lives, and how those lives affected the history of Illinois.

Kim will bring native items that women would have used in their daily lives, as she discusses the role women played within the family unit. The audience will be able to pick up and view the items, learn native language and music, and get the chance to play the drum in this interactive experience.

Kim Sigafus is an award-winning Ojibwa author who writes Native American fiction, non-fiction, children's and young adult books. She has presented on native history, food, and music, and has traveled all over the Midwest in her native regalia, bringing native culture to life. Kim's family is from White Earth Reservation, located in the northwest corner of Minnesota. She sings and drums, as well as crafts dream catchers and Talking Feathers.

# Thursday, November 9, 6:00-7:00 PM The Art Institute of Chicago, Fullerton Hall

"Pliny, Pigments and Painters in the Ancient World"



Join Hilary Becker, a renowned authority on ancient pigments, as she discusses her research on Pliny the Elder's *Naturalis Historia* or *Natural History* (77 CE). Becker studied the ancient Roman text seeking insight into artisanal materials commonly used by artists of the time, like gold foil, Egyptian blue, and shellfish purple. In her discussion of this research, Becker shares what Pliny can tell us about the marketing and use of pigments during this period of Roman history before sitting down with Art Institute conservation scientist Giovanni Verri and curator Katharine Raff to search the museum's collection for traces of ancient color.

This examination is particularly opportune as we celebrate the 2000th anniversary of Pliny's birth, and as the Art Institute, like many institutions, engages in ongoing research on ancient painting techniques.
